Quincy Jerome Leeper

Quincy Jerome Leeper's Obituary Quincy was born on July 26, 1956 to Marian Geraldine Leeper and his father, Leon Hill, of Belmont. Quincy's life ended on October 31, 2025. He lived on Reid Steet in Belmont, NC, with his grandparents, Marion Dewitt Leeper and Pauline Strain Leeper, and family.

Quincy attended the family church, O'Connor Grove A.M.E. Zion, in Belmont and attended Reid High School and South Point High. Then, in Boston, MA, he lived with his aunt, Shirley Richardson and son, Melvin, Quincy's same age, before volunteering for the military in 1979. While serving in the Army, he was stationed in South Korea and later Colorado Springs, Colorado. He served in the military for five and one-half years, and remained in Colorado an additional five years, where he worked at another military base.

Upon returning to Belmont, Quincy worked at the Allen Plant Steam Station and Belmont Abbey College. He eventually moved to San Antonio, Texas, where he lived with his mother, her husband, Charles Hill, and sister, Marina Hill Jefferson. Later, Quincy again returned to Belmont to live with grandmother, Pauline Leeper, until her death in 2004. Then, his life became very challenging, since finding housing and work was difficult. However, he was able to find numerous jobs: Quincy did lawn maintenance, worked in a rest home in Cramerton, NC, tidied the grounds at Henry's Chapel Cemetery with his good friend and cousin, Andre Means, and worked with another good friend, Wayne Johnson, who had a cleaning service. Upon retiring at the age of 62, he worked part-time in a couple of restaurants in downtown Belmont, including The String Bean

Quincy's last residence in Belmont was on Clay Street. However, after his leg amputation in 2024, he moved to Charlotte, NC, where it would be more convenient for his numerous doctor appointments, care, and family visits.

Quincy was a gentleman. He was laid-back, rather quiet, and very courteous. He'd strike up conversations about football, which he enjoyed watching, as well as current local, national, and world news. Quincy enjoyed listening to R & B and jazz music, and watching Westerns when available on his TV. He also liked playing chess, cards, and collecting old coins and pennies.

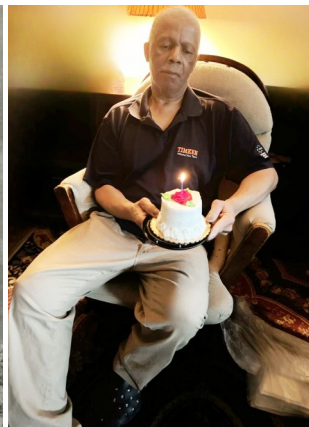
Quincy had a good sense of humor that could catch a most alert person off guard, prompting laughter. He read from his Bible daily. Then, just before his last day in the hospital, he wanted to read that last bit he'd started but didn't get to finish. He said, "So many people keep coming in my room to do something." He didn’t get to finish. At age 69, Quincy had no time left.

Quincy was preceded in death by his mother, Marian Geraldine Leeper Hill, his father, Leon Hill, grandparents, Marion Dewitt Leeper and Pauline Strain Leeper, his aunt, Shirley Leeper Richardson, and uncles Michael Leo Leeper, and Marion Dewitt Leeper, Jr.

Surviving are Quincy's aunts: Alma Ruth Moore of Gastonia, Patricia Leeper Bostic of Matthews, Lucy Leeper Johnson of Wesley Chapel (Carl), and Deloris Leeper Alexander (Curtis) of Charlotte. Quincy has one surviving uncle, George F. Leeper (Faye) of Gastonia.

Quincy and his family greatly appreciated all the kind help and caring that many showed him.
