I'm there.


Sit with me is in the quiet and you will know that I did not leave.

I will be there.



### ... Georgia, more than just an old song... that keeps Georgia on our minds

eorgia Smart Cohen's legacy of kindness, service, and unwavering grace is only a glimpse into the profoundly purposeful life she lives, touching every heart she encounters with her singular elegance and wisdom. To know her is to be touched by her radiant spirit -- a lady who not only checks all the boxes but also creates new ones, setting a standard for all to aspire.

Given her intellect and small-town charm, Georgia could have taken root anywhere. Yet, she chose to dedicate her remarkable talents to our community, making Allendale the beneficiary of her best self. A testament to her belief that true fulfillment lies in nurturing the place you love, and she poured her heart into making our hometown a better place.

Her pursuit of knowledge, a cornerstone of her life, beginning with her formative years at the Allendale Training School complex, and later receiving a diploma from the Historic C.V. Bing High School graduating class of 1968, where she was also voted Miss C.V. Bing. Her academic pursuits lead to her studies at Voorhees University earning a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1972. This foundation led to a professional career that spanned a combined 30 plus years in such fields as academia with the Allendale County School System, property management with Pinewood Park, and municipal administration with the Town of Fairfax, SC and Allendale County ALIVE, where her dedication and meticulous attention to detail were evident to all with whom she worked.

Her dedication to her family was unwavering, rooted in the wisdom and biblical foundation passed down through generations. She was the heart of her home, where every detail reflects her love and willful spirit. From the beautifully set dinner tables to the poised grace in her tone, everything Georgia did was a lesson in living with intention. Her well-manicured appearance and immaculate attire were not for show but rather a simple extension of her belief that every moment—and every person—deserved her very best. With Georgia, nothing was ever out of place, because she lived a life of deliberate purpose and grace. She was high society without the fluff, a rare gem of elegance and purpose.

Beyond her family, Georgia's greatest passion was focused on grooming the next generation of young leaders, especially young women. She encouraged them to do their best, sharing her wisdom and inspiring them with her own example -- the mentor who always knew what to say, offering guidance that was both gentle and firm, and always exactly what was needed. Above all, she instilled in them the core principles of integrity and ethical leadership, encouraging them to live with purpose. It is also this deep love for her community that led her to start the Y-Teen Club a youth-based program where she personally mentored young leaders and instilled in them the values, she held so dear.

Her civic engagement resonated with her belief that a strong community is built on the small, consistent efforts of its people, as she dedicates herself to countless initiatives aimed at making a difference no matter how big or small. Whether she was organizing a fundraiser for the local NAACP, volunteering at church, or simply making sure everyone felt included, her actions spoke of a deep and abiding love for her hometown.

For 53 years, 2 months, and 12 days she was one half of an inseparable pair with her husband, Oliver, when they joined in Holy Matrimony June 17, 1972. You almost never saw one without the other, as they built a life and a

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legacy side-by-side. They were a powerful team, and their marriage was a partnership rooted in shared purpose. Whether leading neighborhood clean-up campaigns or advocating for justice with the local Chapter of the NAACP, where she served as secretary and Oliver as president, they worked in lockstep. Their joint dedication to the community was a quiet but powerful force, a testament to what two people can accomplish together.

Her faith was a guiding light throughout her life, expressed through her active membership at Happy Home Baptist Church and later Mt. Calvary Missionary Baptist Church, where she served with grace on the Usher Board at both houses of worship. She was also a dedicated member of the Fidelity Chapter #40 Order of the Eastern Star (OES) (Past W. Matron), Prince Hall Golden Circle (Past Loyal Lady Ruler), Razor Road/Roosevelt Height Neighborhood Association, Allendale County Arts Society, and LesDames' Social Club, organizations where her commitment to sisterhood and community uplift was untiring. She also enjoyed her role as the premier go-to wedding coordinator as she mastered many responsibilities acting as a couple's trusted guide and logistical expert on their way to the alter – as part confident, part creative director and part project manager – allowing couples to step back from the stress of planning and truly be present for one of the most important days of their lives.

Her high society without the fluff was perfectly balanced by a deep-seated humility and an infectious joy for life. She was an avid traveler, often with her head buried in the adventure, always eager to discover new landscapes and cultures. She found immense pleasure in the simple delights of life—unearthing hidden treasures while plundering through antique shops, feeling the soil in her hands as she tenderly gardened, and gathering friends and family to share in her love cooking and good food. She had a way of finding laughter and light in every room, and she never missed an opportunity to share a quiet story or a piece of wisdom that would stay with you long after the conversation was over. While we remember her for her strength and grace, we will also cherish the memory of her bright smile and the comfort of her presence.

Georgia lived a life that was a masterclass in how to be a good steward of her time, her relationships, and her community. She will forever be an exemplary thoughtful and compassionate individual, filled with integrity, and joy. While we mourn her loss deeply, we find comfort in the countless ways she enriched our lives. Her memory will continue to be a guiding light, reminding us that a well-lived life is one spent in service to others as demonstrated by her parents, the late George Smart, Sr. and Mary Allen Graham; paternal grandparents, the late Charlie and Ida Washington Smart; maternal grandparents, the late Steve Allen, Sr., Alice Adell Walker, and Joe Lee Walker, brothers the late Jimmy and Alphonso Smart.

Her husband, Oliver will forever keep her memory close to heart and is most thankful that God allowed their relationship to flourish beyond measure.
