A Loving Farewell for Mr. Arthur Auburn "Art" Farria, Jr.

December 30, 1950 - November 29, 2025

A Life Filled With Love, Faith, and Family

Arthur Auburn Farria, Jr., beloved husband, father, grandfather, brother, uncle, cousin, and friend, passed away peacefully on Saturday, November 29, 2025, surrounded by his loving family. Born in New Orleans, Louisiana, he carried the spirit, soul, and resilience of his hometown with him throughout his life. He had been baptized as a child at the family church, True Vine Baptist in New Orleans, a moment that sparked his everlasting love for the Lord.

He graduated in May 1968 from Joseph S. Clark Senior High in New Orleans, where he first discovered his love for performance and rhythm as a drum major in the band. He then furthered his education at Grambling State University, where he earned a scholarship to participate as a drum major in the "World-Famed Tiger Marching Band." He ended his time at Grambling early but found his professional calling with Southern Railway (now Norfolk Southern) in New Orleans. His dedication and strong work ethic earned him the respect of his colleagues and lifelong friendships.

It was in New Orleans that he married his first wife, Rhodia Rolling (Farria Charlton). In New Orleans they welcomed their first child, Garrick Arthur Farria, and later moved with the railroad to Cincinnati, Ohio where their family grew with the additions of Jerren Jamar Farria and Ronita Joyce Farria. Art continued his career and embraced the Midwest with his characteristic warmth. The family attended Good News Church of God in Christ and Christ Emmanuel Christian Fellowship. He and Rhodia were married for 25 years. Art was a very involved father, attending all the children's sporting events, becoming the official announcer "voice" of their high school football Friday nights, finding fun adventures for the family to be a part of, and making sure that the little joys of life were experienced.

In time, the railroad led him to Atlanta, Georgia, where he married his second wife, Dorothy Mae Farria, and became stepfather to his bonus children, Timothy Henderson, Margaret Hubbard, and Joia Henderson. Atlanta became a new home filled with new memories, a new community, and renewed joy. Art retired from Norfolk Southern Railway after 40 years of service. He worshipped faithfully at Woods Memorial Baptist Church, where he served proudly as a deacon until the family moved to Ringgold, Georgia, to be closer to family. His faith was not just something he practiced on Sundays; it was the guiding force of his life.

A lifelong sports enthusiast, he was a passionate fan of the Cincinnati Bengals Football team, Cincinnati Reds Baseball team, and the Ohio State Buckeyes Football team. After settling in Georgia, he grew to love the Atlanta Falcons Football and Atlanta Braves Baseball teams—yet he always kept a place in his heart devoted to the New Orleans Saints. No matter the season, you could always find him in his man cave watching one of his teams take the field.

He also held a deep appreciation for Black history, especially Negro League Baseball. Collecting memorabilia and clothing items, he loved discussing the history and legacy of Blacks in baseball. If he wasn't watching sports he was watching old western movies

Above all else, he loved his family. His children, grandchildren, and extended loved ones brought him his greatest joy. His love, his wisdom, and his unwavering support will live on in each of them. Art is preceded in death by his father, Arthur Auburn Farria, Sr., mother, Ida Mae Baxter Farria, and brother, Karl Farria.
