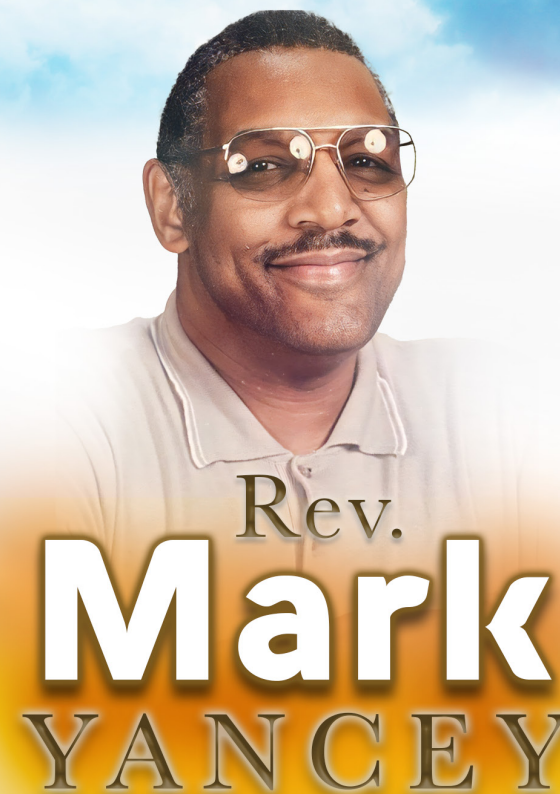

Mark was born August 22, 1948, the youngest of three sons born to the late Ozie and Emma Smith Yancey in Clarke County. Mark joined the Anon Grove Baptist Church at an early age. He was later called to the ministry where he served faithfully for many years until his death. He was called as pastor for two different churches during his ministerial tenure. He attended schools in Athens, Clarke County, graduating from Burney Harris High School. Mark worked various jobs early in his life, but he retired in January 2023 from Clarke County School District after serving for 38 years. He worked in a variety of capacities including security, custodial and transportation services. Rev. Yancey loved singing and attending gospel singing events. He participated in various singing groups and quartets.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Ozie and Emma Smith Yancey; his brother, Clinton P.
