


Life's Story

Charles Leon Alexander passed away peacefully on January 27, 2024, at the age of 89 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He was born on March 10, 1934, in Wise (Warren County), North Carolina to the late Robert Alexander and Ruth (Cobb) Alexander and was the second of four children.

Charles moved to Philadelphia in 1952 where he worked as a retail salesman for Gordon & Sons glass company. Charles joined the United States Army in 1954. He was awarded the National Defense Service Medal and received an Honorable Discharge. He served as a mechanic in the 937th Engineer Group and trained with the 573rd Engineer Pontoon Bridge Company of that group while stationed at Fort Campbell, KY.

Charles married the love of his life, Margaret Tunstall in Warrenton, NC on September 2, 1955. They welcomed their precious daughter, Angie Charlene, in 1960. Charles and Margaret (as they are affectionately known by all who love them) were an example of love, perseverance, and dedication. They were partners in every sense of the word. They moved to Sanford Street in 1969 where the Alexanders truly made a home and were loved and respected by their neighbors. Charles was meticulous in the care of his family and home. He was an avid gardener and could fix almost anything. Charles retired from the School District of Philadelphia where he worked for 37 years as a Fire Safety Specialist. Charles once cleared a fallen tree from his mother's property by himself. His dedication and commitment did not stop there.

He purchased a lifetime membership and became a regular attendee of the annual Reunion Weekend event. He could be found at the business session, the fish fry, and the gala dinner/dance reminiscing with former schoolmates. Charles always pursued excellence and expected the same from others.

Many people had the pleasure of meeting Charles in the past year including nurses, doctors, physical therapists, and aides. All had the chance to witness his kind and charismatic spirit. After all, there is nothing more heartwarming than a hearty Charles Alexander greeting! Many shared how they were encouraged and inspired by him, especially how he loved and cared about his wife. Margaret equally showed us all what it means to love and care for your husband.
