Queen

Queen Victoria Lawrence Smith was born on December 7, 1931, in Camden County, Silco, Georgia. She was the beloved daughter of the late Mack Neil Lawrence and Amelia Atwaters Lawrence. From this union, six children were born, two of whom preceded her in death. Queen was educated in the Camden County School System and graduated from Ralph J. Bunche High School, Class of 1952. She furthered her education at Stanton Vocational School, where she trained as a Practical Nurse. Upon completion of her studies, she began her nursing career at Duval Medical Center, later known as University Hospital, then Shands Jacksonville, and now UF Health Jacksonville. Queen dedicated 50 years of faithful service to the nursing profession and retired from Shands Jacksonville after a distinguished career.

She was a devoted member of Philadelphia Missionary Baptist Church for more than 70 years. During that time, she served diligently on the Church Mission and the Nursing Guild until her health began to decline. Queen had a deep love for caring for the sick, cooking, and baking her famous sour cream pound cakes. She was an exceptional seamstress who could sew nearly anything without a pattern. Her mind remained sharp well into her later years. Even after retirement, she continued to renew her nursing license by completing her continuing education requirements, remaining licensed up until the present time. She often said, "I never know when I'm going to need it." When told that she could no longer walk, she would respond, "I can always be a sitter." She proudly stated that she studied hard to earn her license and, as long as she was in her right mind, she intended to keep it.

Additionally, Queen was a world traveler. Her travels included Paris, France; Madrid, Spain; London, England; San Juan, Puerto Rico. Though she never attended a Jaguars game in person, she was one of their most devoted fans, faithfully following the team through cherished newspaper clippings that kept her connected to every play and season.

In 1958, she married James M. Smith. From this union, two children were born: Karen M. Davis and Dwayne M. Smith. She also lovingly raised her devoted niece, Denise Holden.

Queen leaves to cherish her memory, her siblings: Gladys Hayes, Levy Lawrence, and Ora Dee Gilmore; her daughter-in-law, Lequista Rogers Smith; her grandchildren, Kantrice Minton (Jamone Minton), Ledarius Smith, and Dorian Smith; and her great-grandchildren, Ava Minton and Ashton Minton. She is also survived by dedicated friends: Sadie Fields, Doris McFadden, Rosa Jefferson, and Loretta Jones; a young, devoted friend: Gabriel McDaniel and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins, other relatives, and friends.
