

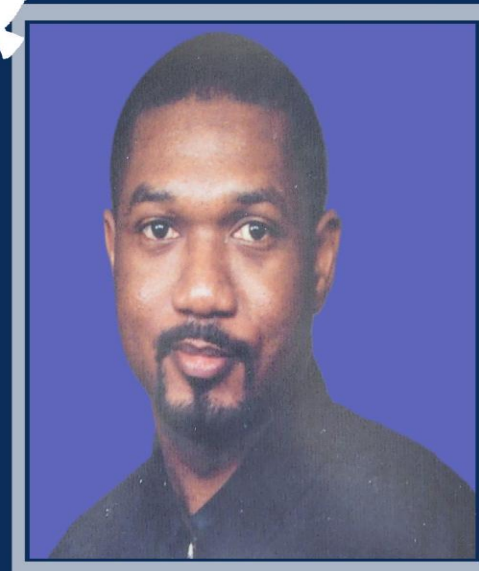

The Life & Legacy of Madison "Clink" F. Clinkscale III

As a proud alumnus of The Rayen School, Madison earned his machine shop certification from Choffin Career & Technical Center, showcasing his love for learning that never wavered. As a lifelong learner, Clink was always the one to seek out new knowledge, enrolling in various courses and workshops to sharpen his skills.

In 1993, he took a leap of faith and relocated to Tacoma, where he made a home for himself embracing life with style and flair. His career spanned many years in the electrical field as a journeyman for the Tacoma Port of Authority, and the Tacoma Power & Gas Company. A true sports enthusiast, Madison bled blue and silver as an avid Dallas Cowboys fan. In his earlier days, he donned the gloves as a fighter with the Gene Minor boxing club, even making waves in the Golden Gloves.
